#### **DEADLINE AND COPIES REQUIRED**

An ORIGINAL and TEN (10) copies of the completed application should be submitted by 4:00 p.m., FRIDAY, JANUARY 16, 2009 to Marilyn Ruiz, Great Cities Institute, Suite 400, CUPPA Hall (412 South Peoria Street), MC 107. ## GREAT CITIES INSTITUTE FACULTY SCHOLAR COMPETITION 2009-2010



### Introduction

These guidelines set forth criteria and procedures for application and acceptance as a Faculty Scholar in the Great Cities Institute (GCI). The Institute focuses on a particular kind of urban study: *engaged research* that will advance our understanding of cities and has relevance to urban issues in Chicago and in urban settings throughout the world. Ideally, engaged research will meet the highest levels of three distinct criteria: (i) partnership (ii) interdisciplinarity and (iii) impact. When preparing research proposals for GCI, therefore, three questions should be kept in mind:

- (i) How and in what ways is the proposed course of study built on partnerships between traditional (academic) and non-traditional sites of knowledge?
- (ii) Is the work interdisciplinary, either in its production or in the way it will be used or read?
- (iii) What will the impact of the research be on (a) the construction and advance of new knowledge and teaching of students and (b) on the great cities of the world, of which Chicago is one?

The Great Cities Institute, a campus-wide institute, with a campus-wide mission, is housed in the College of Urban Planning and Public Affairs. Since its inception in 1995, the Institute has appointed 102 Scholars from 34 different departments and several research institutes at UIC. Currently, the Institute has openings for up to 6 Faculty Scholars with terms for appointment for up to one full academic year beginning Fall, 2009.

### Eligible Applicants

All full-time tenured, tenure-track, and clinical faculty at the rank of assistant professor and above are eligible to apply for this award.

## Work at the Institute

Institute Scholars are expected to pursue their research and participate in the development of the Institute. They will be released from formal teaching and administrative obligations during their appointment at the Institute. The Institute will provide Faculty Scholars with research and administrative support, including seminar and meeting facilities and, when possible, partial research assistantships and office space.

During their time in residence, scholars are expected to:

- Implement their own research/demonstration/policy projects and publications,
- Develop and submit grant proposals, including ones that involve other scholars,
- Actively participate in the development of the Great Cities Institute,
- Participate in the Honors College course-“Great Cities: UIC’s Metropolitan Commitment”,
- Participate in the Great Cities Institute Lecture Series,
- Contribute at least one paper to the Institute’s Working Paper Series.

## Topics

The Institute will support meritorious projects on topics covering the broadest range of engaged research on the urban and we have chosen proposals from faculty in every college on campus. GCI is a truly university wide institute for all faculty. We do have some research themes, however, that you might want to consider. We are especially interested in faculty scholars doing work in one of the following three theme areas:

**a) Development:** Historically, the areas of community development and economic development have been key to the research efforts of Great Cities. While we retain our interest in these approaches to “development,” we are both refocusing and expanding our efforts in engaged studies of “development” to include individual, community, urban and global development topics that impact change in the city—both past, present and future.

**b) Health:** The notion of “Healthy Cities,” unveiled first at a conference we sponsored several years ago, embodies our new interdisciplinary approach to health, which combines strong links to health sciences, health policy and practices, community and urban conditions of human settlements. This theme is informed by UIC’s strength in the health and health policy sciences and its equally clear interest in the humanities and social sciences and in the conditions of the city that impact “health.” In short, the individual, collective and global conditions that challenge and define the “healthy city” are just some of the subjects that inform this theme.

**c. Governance.** If there is a “healthy” and well “developed” city, but there is little or no social or redistributive justice for the communities and individuals of the city, then there are definite challenges to producing a “great city.” GCI seeks applications from UIC faculty in the general areas of urban governance, finance

and policy studies and the whole host of political, social and economic areas attendant to the production of the rights to the city and the policies that serve such rights. Key areas where GCI and potential scholars can make a contribution are rethinking and theorizing local governance, municipal finance and intergovernmental relations, regional and local governance, leadership and management challenges and reform, the role of the state in contested urban environments, among many other versions of this theme.

## **GCI and its Objectives**

- The Institute houses the *UIC Neighborhoods Initiative* program, a comprehensive, multidisciplinary program to address urban issues in partnership with groups and organizations in the neighborhoods around the university, specifically, Pilsen and the Near West Side. - The Institute is particularly interested in projects that build on the work of past or current Scholars or have the potential to become lasting areas of specialization for the Institute ([a list of 2008 - 2009 Faculty Scholars and Institute Fellows and researchers can be accessed at the GCI website at \[www.uic.edu/cuppa/gci\]\(http://www.uic.edu/cuppa/gci\)](#)).
- The Institute gives priority to projects that (i) are significantly involved with external constituencies (or partners), (ii) have clear implications for the *building of new knowledge about the urban* and have an *impact on Chicago and other great cities in the world*.
- Therefore, the hallmark of the Institute is “*engaged research:*” *that is work that ideally seeks to be at once original, interdisciplinary, high impact research, carried out in partnership with non-traditional, as well as other traditional external sources of knowledge.*

## **Schedule, Deadlines**

Completed applications are due by 4:00 p.m., Friday, January 16, 2009. Decisions are expected to be made at the middle of March, 2009. Faculty Scholar appointments for academic year 2009-2010 begin in the Fall semester 2009 and continue through the Spring semester 2010.

Completed applications should be delivered to the Great Cities Institute Faculty Scholar Competition, Great Cities Institute, 412 South Peoria, Suite 400. Please submit an original application together with ten copies.

## **Answers to most commonly asked questions**

Department heads and deans must sign the application cover sheet. Applicants with appointments in more than one department/college are required to obtain signatures from the heads/deans of each department and college.

Summer salary is not included in the appointment. If you intend to work during the summer, you will need to find another means of support. On the other hand, office space at GCI is generally available during the summer.

For grant applications initiated by the Institute, ICR distribution is negotiated. It is the intention of the Institute to be as liberal as possible in supporting the home units of Scholars as sites of credit for faculty research activities.

Departments will be compensated for the cost of covering courses normally taught by the Institute Scholars at the rate of \$4,000 per course. Therefore, a full-time appointment is generally reimbursed at \$16,000 per academic year. In exceptional circumstances, this rate may be negotiated.

### **Proposal Guidelines**

All full-time tenured, tenure-track, and clinical faculty at the rank of assistant professor and above are eligible to apply for this award. The proposal will be subject to peer review by a committee composed of faculty from throughout UIC, past Faculty Scholars and representatives of GCI, who review and recommend scholars for the coming year.

#### **Submit the original together with ten copies of:**

- 1) the completed and signed cover sheet,
- 2) a 4-6 page summary of the research you expect to accomplish during your tenure as a Scholar that addresses the following:
  - a. Purpose and description of the research,
  - b. Your expertise or background in the proposed area or project,
  - c. Unique contributions of your proposed project to policy or practice,
  - d. External funding potential of the project,
  - e. Your expected contributions to the growth and development of the Institute.
- 3) a current and complete CV, and,
- 4) a bio-sketch of not more than one page.
